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Pre-Departure: A Quick Guide to Support Services

Upon completion of employment formalities, you will be guided to apply for an Employment Visa in the Bangladeshi Consulate closest to you, in your home country of where you are residing currently. Holders of dual citizenship including Bangladesh need to inform the HR Office accordingly and obtain independent advice on their legal status in Bangladesh.

Visa, Work Permit and Security Clearance

The Government of Bangladesh has a specific procedure for the authorization of foreign citizens to be employed in Bangladesh. You will be guided by the Human Resources Office in all matters related to obtaining an E-visa (Employment Visa), or other visa according to your contract. **Please do not enter the country on a Tourist visa if you have an employment contract.**

Upon arrival, AUW will continue the registration process by applying for a Work Permit and obtaining mandatory Security Clearance. Normally, you will be able to travel out of the country for the duration of your E-visa; however, as its expiry date approaches, you should not leave Bangladesh until it is extended internally. Please note that if you leave while your E-visa has not been extended, the whole process of obtaining visa has to be repeated, and the application may be rejected. Owing to these considerations, AUW will only invite you travel to Bangladesh when you have obtained the correct entry visa.

Personal and Emergency Contact Information

Along with your job offer and contract details, the Human Resources Office will maintain your confidential personnel record. Please provide copies of personal identity documents, emergency contact details, copies of your education credentials (officially translated in English, and including a Transcript) as requested by the HRO. A complete file of these documents is required in order for your official employment to begin.

Travel to Bangladesh

You may plan your trip to Bangladesh with arrival in Dhaka or directly in Chittagong. The following airlines have direct international flights to Chittagong, which may be useful for your first arrival into the country: Regent (from Bangkok and Kolkata), Thai Airways (from Bangkok), FlyDubai (from Dubai). If you arrive via Dhaka, please pay attention to the connecting flight to Chittagong, as you may need to spend the night in Dhaka. If this is the case, please liaise with AUW to arrange an overnight stay at the Dhaka Guest House and airport transfer.

The AUW Travel and Logistics Office will be happy to provide you with booking options for the most efficient trip. Please contact Ms. Shanjida Khaled at shanjida.khaled@auw.edu.bd for further assistance.



Shipping of Personal Belongings

Shipping of personal belongings is possible but it involves a customs clearance procedure, which can be cumbersome, take a long time, and incur additional fees. AUW recommends that – where applicable – you use your shipping allowance as extra baggage on arrival (and departure). Most household items are easily available in Chittagong.

Health Advisory

At your discretion, you should visit your doctor ahead of travelling to Chittagong for an update on vaccinations and any specific health condition that may require prescribed medication. Please bring a stock of such medication to last you until your next trip home. AUW maintains a well-equipped Health and Wellness Center for first-aid assistance and medical examination. A qualified medical doctor is on campus at specific times who will be able to assist you.

Accommodation at AUW

Faculty and staff who are eligible for AUW accommodation, will be assigned to a single or shared apartment (as per contract) in one of the residences which include semi-furnished apartments, with a fully equipped kitchen, bathrooms adjacent to each bedroom, AC and essential furniture. Bed linen and towels are provided. Household items are easily available for purchase in Chittagong.

Until you fully settle in and get oriented, please do not attempt to travel within the city on your own. General University Information

AUW is an independent, international organization governed by a special Charter enacted by the Parliament of Bangladesh in 2006.

Mission

AUW seeks to graduate women who will be skilled and innovative professionals, service-oriented leaders in the businesses and communities in which they will work and live, and promoters of intercultural understanding and sustainable human and economic development in Asia and throughout the world. More specifically, AUW seeks:

- To educate women to become highly motivated and effective professionals, leaders, and service-oriented citizens;
- To provide a vibrant and diverse residential learning community where highly talented women and those with uncommon potential from many cultural and religious backgrounds can grow both intellectually and personally;
- To create a student-focused learning environment where the arts, humanities, and natural and social sciences establish a broad base of inquiry, where disciplinary and independent studies provide learning depth, and where applied studies in both the general studies and majors' curricula require students to link theoretical understanding with contemporary issues and challenges facing Asia and the world; and
- To focus student learning on the acquisition of intellectual abilities, reflective personal growth, leadership abilities, and a service-oriented outlook.

A Brief History of AUW

The story of AUW began well before its inaugural Access Academy class entered in 2008. The idea for the University grew out of the World Bank/UN Task Force on Higher Education and Society. In 2000, the Task Force published its findings in a report entitled "Higher Education in Developing Countries: Peril and Promise" (see <http://www.tfhe.net/>), which concluded that developing countries must improve the quality of their institutions of higher learning, in both governance and pedagogy, in order to compete in today's increasingly globalized, knowledge-based economy. AUW was partly a response to such need.

In January 2004, the Government of Bangladesh granted more than 100 acres of land for the construction of AUW's permanent campus in Chittagong. Fundraising and planning efforts for AUW officially began in November 2001, when the AUW Support Foundation was incorporated as a non-profit institution under



section 501(c)3 of the United States Internal Revenue Code. AUW's Support Foundation is governed by a Board of Directors, which was established upon the group's incorporation as a non-profit organization. The AUWSF Board of Directors published a Plan of Operations in May 2005, laying out the basic plans for AUW's curriculum, target student population, and sustainability efforts.

AUW began operations in March 2008. Its first cohort of students consisted of 130 young women from six countries: Bangladesh, Cambodia, India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. This inaugural class attended the Access Academy, AUW's year-long bridge program designed to prepare underserved students for the rigors of university education. After completing the Access program, 128 of them continued into the first year of their undergraduate studies, and were joined by a number of direct-entry students who began the undergraduate program in 2009. Also in 2009, AUW's initial Board of Trustees was elected by the International Support Committee of the Asian University for Women in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Asian University for Women.

AUW Charter

The AUW Charter is a law adopted by the Parliament of Bangladesh, which gives official status to the University, and the right to award its own degrees. It sets out the general regulations, rights and obligations of the institution, its governance structure and the duties of the Board of Trustees, Chancellor and Vice Chancellor. University Governance

The Asian University for Women is governed by a Board of Trustees, which is currently chaired by Dr. Dipu Moni, Chair, Parliamentary Committee on Foreign Affairs, Parliament of Bangladesh. The initial Board of Trustees was elected by the International Support Committee of the Asian University for Women in 2009 in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Asian University for Women. The University also enjoys the support of a number of the most important leaders in government, business, and academia, leaders who

Academic Governance

Academic Structure

The current academic structure of AUW comprises two non-degree preparatory programs, a Core Program (General Education Requirement), five Majors and a number of Minors. Students who complete the full requirements of the Core Program and their chosen Major qualify for a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Science. Non-Degree Programs

Pre-Access (Pathways for Promise) is an intensive English language and Mathematics training program launched in 2016, which prepares young women from socio-economically challenged backgrounds to enter the AUW Access Academy and thereafter the full undergraduate program.

Access Academy prepares students from diverse cultural and educational backgrounds for the rigorous, American-style undergraduate liberal arts curriculum at the Asian University for Women.

The majority of AUW students enter the University through the Pathways for Promise or through the Access Academy programs, both of which last for a full academic year.

Special Workshops and Training Programs are offered throughout the year for students, faculty and staff, to enhance their knowledge in a specific field or provide practical experience. AUW hosts multiple such events, including many visiting faculty from partner institutions across the world. AUW welcomes initiatives from its own faculty to organize co-curricular activities that enhance student learning, feature research projects and outcomes, and connect AUW with the wider academic community.

Degree Programs

AUW follows a US-style liberal arts and sciences curriculum, including a Core Program (General Education Requirement) common to all students, selection of Majors, Minors and/or Free Elective Courses. The graduation requirement for a Bachelor's Degree is based on successful completion of 120 credits (generally based on 30 4-credit courses) taken over a period of three years.

AUW is introducing the option of Double Major in AY 2018-2019, which will be piloted with the Science Programs, and adopted further as a University-wide policy.

Degree Plans

To facilitate a smooth progression from the Core Program to completion of Major and Minor requirements, and on-time graduation, AUW has adopted a Degree Plan advisory process for all students. All faculty serve as Academic Advisors to a selected number of students and will be specially trained to guide students in their selection of courses. Each student must fill out/update an Individual Study Plan (based on the general Major Degree Plan) and submit to Academic Registry prior to course registration for each semester. The Orientation Program will include a special session on Degree Plans and course scheduling.
