CHATTOGRAM, BANGLADESH JANUARY 21-22, 2023

This conference commemorates a life of hope of a young woman named Mahsa Amini. Barely 22 years old at the time of her death, Mahsa's life was brutally cut short on September 16, 2022 when she died in a Tehran hospital after being arrested by the "Morality Police" of the Islamic Republic of Iran. Aspiring to become a lawyer, Mahsa became a victim of unjust laws. Instead of safeguarding a citizen from danger, the state itself became the perpetrator of murder of this young woman. Her alleged crime: her *hijab* was not adequate; some unruly strands of her hair uncontrollably sneaked out of her *hijab*. We condemn the forces that caused Mahsa's death and join women and men around the world in seeking justice for Mahsa and freedom for women in Iran and everywhere else where justice and equality continue to elude them.

We also honor another Iranian woman, the mother of a daughter, Maryam Mirzakhani. Born in Tehran in 1977, Maryam Mirzakhani, studied at Sharif University and then went on to do her PhD at Harvard University and, subsequently, became a professor of Mathematics at Stanford University. Maryam Mirzakhani succumbed to breast cancer in July 2017 at the Stanford Hospital at the young age of 40. By then, she had already earned the Fields Medal, the highest honor of achievement in Mathematics. With her family's consent and her academic advisor's encouragement, AUW will establish the Maryam Mirzakhani Chair in Mathematics to be held by an outstanding female mathematician.



Ms. Mahdia Ahmadi, Masters Student, AUW, is currently a member of the International Women Peace Group (IWPG) and works in Delegate Affairs at the AUW International Model United Nations. She has taught English for four years in various countries and continues teaching English on a voluntary basis at different academies in Afghanistan. Ms. Ahmadi holds a bachelor's degree in Business Administration, Finance, from COMSTATS University Islamabad and will be graduating with a Master's in Education from AUW. Recognizing the dire need for educational opportunities for Afghan girls, her plans after graduating from AUW include building a secondary school for girls where she can give women a chance to complete their studies.



Ms. Nusaibah Ghaleb Alnahari, AUW Class of 2023, Bioinformatics, grew up in Yemen, Hudaidah. As a result of the war, she and her family were forced to leave the city in 2018 and settle in Yemen's capital, Sana'a. An active member of the AUW community, Ms. Alnahari is a junior PR manager for the Bioinformatics Club and treasurer of the Poetry Club. She also loves volunteering at AUW functions in order to explore aspects of life outside academics. Ms. Alnahari's goal after AUW is to continue her education and pursue Master's and PhD degrees.



Ms. Hala Alshaar, AUW Class of 2024, Bioinformatics, is from Hama, Syria. She is the youngest of seven siblings. In addition to her own academic work at AUW, she has served as a teaching assistant for Precalculus and worked with a disability rights program. Ms. Alshaar has chosen to pursue a Bioinformatics major since it will draw upon her computational skills and her interest in the natural sciences. She hopes to continue working in the field after her graduation from AUW.

Ms. Afsaneh Beschloss, Founder & CEO, Rock Creek Capital, previously served as the Managing Director and Partner at the Carlyle Group. She was Treasurer and Chief Investment Officer of the World Bank and also worked at J.P. Morgan. Ms. Beschloss has advised governments, central banks, and regulatory agencies on global public policy and financial policy as well as energy. She led the World Bank's energy investments and policy work on areas including sustainable investing, renewable energy, power, and infrastructure to reduce carbon emissions and founded its Natural Gas Group as a transitional fuel.



Mrs. Cherie Blair, CBE, KC, AUW Chancellor, AUW Council of Patrons, is a leading international lawyer and committed campaigner for women's rights. She is the Founder of the Cherie Blair Foundation for Women, established in 2008 to help women build small and growing businesses in developing and emerging markets, enabling them to contribute to their economies and have a stronger voice in their societies. She is also the Founder and Chair of Omnia Strategy LLP, a law firm through which she represents clients in international arbitrations and legal cases. Her husband, Tony Blair, was Prime Minister from 1997 to 2007.



Dr. Svetlana Bochaver, *Product Manager, Marketing & Comms for Education, Yandex* (*Russia*), oversees the end-to-end implementation of product delivery projects. She previously worked as a Research Fellow, Project Manager at the Institute of Linguistics, Russian Academy of Science, where she recruited and led teams focused on multi-national research and educational projects, authored 30 research papers, presented in over 30 academic conferences, and designed 3 PhD Education programs for the Russian Academy of Sciences.



Ms. Sonu Rani Das, Women's Affairs Secretary, Bangladesh Dalit & Excluded Rights Movement (BDERM), and one of the rising leaders of the Bangladesh Dalit movement, was born and raised in a cleaner's colony in Narayangonj district. After experiencing extreme patriarchy in her life, she was driven to improve the fate of millions of Dalit women. She became a member of multiple Dalit-led organizations and forums, and in 2008, was nominated as Secretary of Women Affairs at the Bangladesh Dalit and Excluded Rights Movement. She believes that no Dalit woman will be free from the shackles of age long patriarchal practice unless they are mobilized and empowered to raise their voice. Through her work she has been recognized by international organizations and participated at advocacy events around the world.



Dr. Glenn DeVoogd, California State University, Dominguez Hills, works to promote educational programs that foster literacy instruction. He has taught a range of courses in education primarily focused on literacy instruction, but also in the areas of disability and educational administration. Dr. DeVoogd has written over 30 publications primarily in the area of critical comprehension of texts, but has also published about reading instruction, children's literature, and on the use of technology as a tool for instruction in teacher education. In 2020, Dr. DeVoogd and his co-author, Dr. Maureen McLaughlin, were recognized by the International Literacy Association for two articles they published that addressed the challenges of teaching during the twin pandemics of COVID-19 and systemic racism. He was given a faculty career award for Excellence in Education in 2012 from Fresno State University.



Ms. Karen DeVoogd, the Conflict Resolution Educator Trainer for the Domestic Harmonizer Program (DHP) at the Whitaker Peace & Development Initiative (WPDI), has worked on the DHP since 2016 to create the program's curriculum, deliver in-person and virtual training to schools, and support teachers and students in applying skills of conflict resolution and restorative practices. Prior to joining WPDI, Ms. DeVoodg held a series of leadership roles in the field of conflict resolution education in California and nationally. She was previously a faculty instructor with the system-wide California State University multiple subject teacher credential program, CalStateTEACH through the CSU Chancellor's Office and CSU Fresno. In this role, she supported new teachers in meeting California Credentialing Program Standards for Multiple Subject preparation. She possesses a Masters in Curriculum and Instruction and a Bachelors in Elementary Education, both from Michigan State University.



Dr. Tim DeVoogd, AUW Trustee, Professor of Psychology & Neurobiology and Behavior, Cornell University, studies neuroanatomical effects of learning, looking at neural consequences of song learning and spatial learning in songbirds. In his professional life, he has chosen research collaborations and teaching commitments that have brought him into close contact with scientists and students in more than a dozen countries (sabbaticals at Oxford, University of Cape Town, and National University of Singapore). In Qatar, Singapore and South Africa, he has taught students for whom English was not their first language. Through these interactions, he became interested in scientific exchange as a vehicle for understanding.



Professor Larry Jay Diamond, Mosbacher Senior Fellow in Global Democracy at the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies and Professor, by courtesy, of Sociology and of Political Science, Stanford University, leads FSI's Program on Arab Reform and Democracy, based at the Center on Democracy, Development and the Rule of Law, which he directed for more than six years. He also co-leads with (Eileen Donahoe) the Global Digital Policy Incubator, based at FSI's Cyber Policy Center. Professor Diamond is also a Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institutions, where he leads the programs on China's Global Sharp Power and on Taiwan in the Indo-Pacific Region.



Ms. Kat Fotovat, Acting Ambassador-at-Large, The Secretary's Office of Global Women's Issues, U.S. Department of State, leads a team of gender experts promoting gender equality efforts including support of women, peace, and security, countering violent extremism, promoting women's economic empowerment, and combating gender-based violence. She has over 20 years of experience advocating gender and human rights globally, specifically in conflict and post-conflict settings. Previously, she was Director for the Office of Communications, Policy, and Partnerships, in the Bureau of Conflict and Stabilization Operations where she oversaw an expert team that provided policy and strategy guidance to respond to atrocities, fragility, increase global stability and peacebuilding, and integrating women, peace, and security efforts in areas of conflict.



Ms. Heather Harms, Director of Global Programs, The Secretary's Office of Global Women's Issues, U.S. Department of State, is responsible for assistance programs that advance women's empowerment and full participation in political, economic, and social life. She has overseen gender equality, human rights, governance, and civilian security programs in Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Western Hemisphere. Prior to joining the Department, Ms. Harms worked for the Public International Law and Policy Group on rule of law programming in Kosovo. She holds a J.D. from George Washington University Law School and a B.A. in International Studies from the University of Washington.



Dr. Rubana Huq, AUW Vice Chancellor, earned wide prominence as the first female president of the Bangladesh Garments Manufacturers' and Exporters' Association (BGMEA). She is a published poet who earned her PhD in Literature from India's Jadavpur University. She played a significant role launching AUW's Pathways for Promise program, which enables exceptionally talented workers from Bangladesh's ready-made garment factories to enroll at AUW. She was named as one of BBC's top 100 women in the world in 2013 and again in 2014. Dr. Huq is also a Visiting Fellow at the Stern School of Business at New York University and the Asia Center at Harvard University.



Ms. Nilab Ibrahimy, AUW Class of 2020, Politics, Philosophy & Economics, is currently a Master of Public Affairs candidate at Brown University. She graduated from AUW with a bachelor's degree in Politics, Philosophy, and Economics. Previously, she worked with Moore Afghanistan, a full-member firm of Moore Global. Ms. Ibrahimy also worked with a team to set up a make-shift school for the recent Afghan evacuees on a military base in Wisconsin. She hopes to pursue a career in educational policy for refugees around the world.



Dr. Beena Khurana, Dean of Arts and Sciences, AUW, has successfully contributed to teaching, research, and administration in various educational institutions in the US (Rutgers University, UC Berkeley, Cornell University, California Institute of Technology, California Polytechnic State University) and UK (Sussex University). She is passionate about students and focuses intensely on creating rewarding and meaningful educational experiences. In addition to her leadership role on the faculty, Dr. Khurana teaches an introductory course on psychology.



Ms. Zulikha Malekzai, Masters Student, AUW, is currently enrolled in the Master of Arts in Education program at AUW. She completed her undergraduate degree in Public Policy and Administration at Kabul University in 2017. From 2018 to 2019, she held the position of Research Assistant Intern at the Ministry of Finance before being promoted to Research Assistant in 2020. In this most recent role, she was responsible for preparing work plans, conducting reviews, arranging meetings, and analyzing primary and secondary data.



Ms. Kathy Matsui, a Co-Founder of AUW, is General Partner, MPower Partners, former Goldman Sachs Japan Vice Chair, was ranked No. 1 in Japan Equity Strategy by Institutional Investor magazine and was chosen by The Wall Street Journal as one of the "10 Women to Watch in Asia" for her ground-breaking "Womenomics" research. She serves as an external board director of Fast Retailing Inc., adjunct professor at Kyoto University's Graduate School of Management, Co-Chair of the US-Japan Council Board of Directors, and board member of the AUW Support Foundation.



Mr. Jack Meyer, a Co-Founder of AUW, is AUW Support Foundation Chairman, AUW Board of Trustees Vice Chair, Former Senior Managing Partner at Convexity Capital Management L.P. located in Boston. He co-founded the firm with managing partners, Dave Mittelman and Maurice Samuels in July 2005. Before Convexity, Mr. Meyer was President and CEO of Harvard Management Company, which manages the University's endowment assets, pension funds, charitable trusts and pooled income funds totaling in excess of \$31 billion by the end of his term. He is the Chair of the Boston Ballet and is on the Board of Directors of The Boston Foundation.



Professor Abbas Milani, Stanford University, is the Hamid and Christina Moghadam Director of Iranian Studies at Stanford University and a Professor (by courtesy) in the Stanford Global Studies Division. He is also one of the founding co-directors of the Iran Democracy Project and a research fellow at the Hoover Institution. His expertise includes U.S.-Iran relations as well as Iranian cultural, political, and security issues. He taught at Tehran University's Faculty of Law and Political Science until 1986, where he was also a member of the Board of Directors of the university's Center for International Relations. After moving to the United States, he was the Chair of the Political Science Department at the Notre Dame de Namur University for 14 years.



Dr. Sonajharia Minz, Vice Chancellor, Sido Kanhu Murmu University, is an Indian academician and an Adivasi activist. She worked as an assistant professor in the Department of Computer Science at Madurai Kamaraj University in 1991 and the Barkatullah University of Bhopal in 1990. In 1992, Dr. Minz became assistant professor of Computer Science at Jawaharlal Nehru University. Later, she was appointed Associate Professor in 1997 and was promoted as professor in the School of Computer & Systems Sciences at Jawaharlal Nehru University.



Mr. Saifullah Muhammad, Executive Director, Rohingya Centre of Canada, is a young Rohingya activist who has spent years advocating for the refugees and persecuted minorities. During his studies at the Conestoga College, he helped found the 'Canadian Rohingya Development Initiative' to expose the Rohingya genocide to the world stage and to create an innovative educational platform for the refugee youths all over the world. He has recently established the "Rohingya Centre of Canada" in downtown Kitchener to serve the refugees and newcomers better particularly the Rohingya community in Canada and beyond.



HE Ambassador Lilly Nicholls, *High Commissioner of Canada to Bangladesh*, works with her team to provide information to Canadians living in or visiting Bangladesh, including health and safety information, Canadian education opportunities, Canadian products and services, and visa and immigration services. She previously served as the Director of Development Research and Learning of the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development. She has 30 years of experience forging collaborative partnerships and promoting innovative solutions in the international sphere.



HE Tomas Niklasson, EU's Special Envoy for Afghanistan, works to strengthen engagement and relations with Afghanistan. He, along with the Special Envoys for Afghanistan of other countries, is committed to addressing the humanitarian, economic, and social crises in Afghanistan that have affected public safety, employment, women and girls' access to education, and much more. In his position, he emphasizes the need to support Afghans with basic services, such as education, health, and livelihoods.



Ms. Samira Panahi, AUW Class of 2020, Economics, is the youngest daughter in her family, and the first to enter higher education. Ms. Panahi is committed to pursuing her goals. As she states, "As a woman you need to be brave to surpass society's expectations and live the way you want." Described by her teachers as a creative mind and a "brilliant photographer," Ms. Panahi's strengths lie in artistic pursuits, particularly music, photography, film, and graphic design.



Dr. Bryan Penprase, Professor of Physics & Astronomy, Soka University, develops strategic partnerships and builds collaborations with universities and colleges to advance undergraduate education and research. He previously served as Dean of Faculty for three years, in which he created new academic programs, and managed the curriculum design, hiring and implementation of a new Concentration in Life Sciences. Dr. Penprase formerly served for 20 years as a professor of Physics and Astronomy at Pomona College, where he served as a department chair, and was the inaugural co-director the Liberal Arts Consortium for Online Learning.



Honorable Mr. Michael Posner, Former US Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Rights and Labor and Professor of Ethics and Finance, Stern School of Business, New York University, serves as the Director of the Center for Business and Human Rights at the Stern School of Business, the first-ever human rights center at a business school. Prior to joining NYU Stern, Mr. Posner served in the Obama Administration from 2009 to 2013 as Assistant Secretary of State for the Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights and Labor. In 2010 he chaired the Voluntary Principles on Security and Human Rights. From 1978 to 2009, he led Human Rights First, a New York-based human rights advocacy organization.



Ms. Fatima Qasemi, Masters Student, AUW, is currently pursuing a Master of Arts in Education at AUW. She graduated from Loman High School in Ghazni, Afghanistan before completing a BA in Journalism, Psychology and English Language in 2019 at the Indian Academy Degree College in Bangalore, India. Along with obtaining a diploma in Human Rights Studies in 2020, Ms. Qasemi has experience working as an Administrative Officer at Gawharshad University, Afghanistan and as the Secretariat of the Computer Science Faculty of Gharjistan University where she was responsible for monthly and annual reports, preparing semester timetables, hosting academic conferences, and handling all student-related issues.



Former Prime Minister Poul Nyrup Rasmussen, Denmark, served as Prime Minister from 1993 to 2001. After receiving a degree in economics from the University of Copenhagen in 1971, Mr. Rasmussen worked for the Danish Trade Union Council until 1986. He became its chief economist in 1980. He served as the managing director of the Employees' Capital Pension Fund and as chairman of Lalandia Invest from 1986 to 1988. In 1987 he became deputy chairman of the Social Democrats and in 1988 a member of the Folketing, or parliament. He became the leader of the Social Democrats in 1992.



Dr. Sangita Rayamajhi, Former Professor of Literature, AUW, is considered a pioneering scholar of women's studies in Nepal where she taught for over twenty years at Tribhuvan University prior to joining AUW. Her teaching interests range from gender and sexuality to American, British and non-Western fiction to theatre and film studies. While experiencing the adverse effects of Nepal's political instability as a woman in academia, the University of Alabama offered to host Dr. Rayamajhi as a visiting scholar with the support of the Scholar Rescue Fund, where she delivered a variety of public lectures. After her fellowship ended, she accepted a position with AUW. She now works at the Center for Advanced Studies in South Asia.



Mr. Andrew Schroeder, Direct Relief, is the Vice President for Research and Analysis at the global medical aid NGO. He is also the co-director of the CrisisReady project on private data for public good, co-hosted between Direct Relief and Harvard Data Science initiative. Mr. Schroeder is also the co-founder of WeRobotics, a global non-profit organization which builds local capacity in robotics and AI for humanitarian aid, public health, and environmental protection. Milestones of his tenure include growth of NYU's global network, including campuses in Abu Dhabi and Shanghai; a merger with Polytechnic University, now the NYU Tandon School of Engineering; and the largest increase in Arts and Science faculty in the University's history.
